BRITISH VALUES

IN RETURN, WE EXPECT YOU TO:

- **Be respectful to everyone – students, staff, visitors and neighbours**
- **Attend 100% of lessons, including maths, English and tutorials, and be punctual**
- **Ensure your work adheres to your course's guidelines and deadlines, avoiding copying the work of others (plagiarism) which includes misuse of AI (e.g. ChatGPT)**
- **Wear your College ID badge at all times on campus and during educational visits, ensuring that your photograph and badge information is visible at all times. Your badge must be provided to staff upon request**
- **Follow all health and safety rules**
- **Respect College property including accommodation, equipment and computers, as well as the property of staff and other students**
- **Behave responsibly inside and outside of College, including online**
- **Respect our College and the neighbouring environment; recycle where possible and dispose of litter in bins**
- **Dress appropriately and respectfully for a professional working environment**

WE DO NOT ACCEPT:

- Discrimination, bullying, harassment or threat (sexual, physical, emotional, verbal or online) towards any other student, member of staff, visitor or member of our local community
- Foul, racist, sexual, violent, offensive or abusive language and/or behaviour
- Spitting
- Unsafe actions that put others at risk or break the College's health and safety regulations
- Instigation or promotion of violent or extremist views or ideas, including online activity
- Carrying, using or distributing alcohol, drugs, solvents, energy drinks or other illegal/harmful substances
- Entering campus under the influence of alcohol, drugs, solvents or other illegal/harmful substances
- The carrying of any weapon or use of any item as a weapon, including laser pens
- Behaviour that disrupts the learning of others
- Any form of academic or exam misconduct including copying the work of others (plagiarism)

- Use of mobile phones/smart watches during lessons or exams (unless agreed by the tutor)
- Smoking, including e-cigarettes or vapes, outside of the designated areas next to car parks
- Damage to any College property or possessions, or to that of our local community neighbours
- Anti-social behaviour on-campus or within the neighbouring area
- Wearing hoods, balaclavas, peaked caps, face masks or other items that obscure the face, unless it is integral to your faith
- Low rise or sagging trousers or jogging bottoms, revealing clothing or clothing with offensive slogans or language

IT AND DIGITAL USAGE

- No damage or alteration to IT equipment or systems
- Only use personal college ID and password, which must not be shared with anyone
- No access to any unauthorised sites or chat rooms that contain abusive, sexist, pornographic or unlawful materials
- No communication with extremist organisations or access to extremist content online
- No unauthorised recording of staff or students

For everyone's safety, College IT and digital equipment has safeguarding monitoring software installed. Please be aware this is monitored continuously and improper use may lead to disciplinary action and referral to the police.

SPOTLIGHT ON ATTENDANCE

Outstanding attendance is key to ensuring positive outcomes on our courses. Missing or arriving late to lessons can mean missing crucial knowledge and skills that are not only required for final assessments, but to benefit you in your future career.

We expect all students to attend 100% of timetabled classes, including tutorials and English and Maths. Attendance and punctuality will be monitored and recorded through class registers, reported to course leaders.

If you are in receipt of student financial support in the form of a bursary, failure to attend a minimum of 95% of your timetabled sessions will result in bursary payments being paused until your attendance improves.

We understand that in rare cases there may be challenges outside of your control that may impact your attendance. In these cases, please email absence@bdc.ac.uk and this information will be shared with your tutor and your Student Achievement Mentor.



OUR CAMPUSES



Our college has multiple sites and campuses, whilst also offering courses in community locations across the London Borough of Barking and Dagenham.

RUSH GREEN CAMPUS

The largest of our campuses, Rush Green, is situated a short walk or bus ride from Romford Town Centre where students can study higher level technical qualifications in our **£15m facilities**.



BARKING CAMPUS

Our Barking Campus comprises of the Technical Skills Academy and classes held at the Barking Learning Centre.



THE LEARNING RESOURCE CENTRE (LRC)

Located at our Rush Green Campus, the Learning Resources Centre (LRC) is a hub for information.

We have a range of course and career-related reading materials, books, ebooks as well as shelves of fiction. We have PCs within the LRC that are available to use whenever the LRC is open and Chromebooks are available for daily loan. Current learners can borrow Chromebooks for two weeks to help with studies at home.

LEARNING SUPPORT

Our team is dedicated to providing learning support to help students reach their academic, social, and personal outcomes. If you have a disability and/or learning difficulty, we can offer you a range of support interventions tailored to meet your individual needs.

Additionally, we provide exam support for eligible students, ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to perform to the best of their abilities. Our Service for the Deaf is available if you require a sign language specialist. Our goal is to create an inclusive learning environment and a supportive experience to empower our students to succeed.

LEARNER SUPPORT ZONE

We have a fantastic team of staff dedicated to supporting you in and around your studies throughout your time with us.

Students are required to wear their college ID cards at all times whilst on our campuses. If you lose or forget your ID card, the Learner Support Zone will be able to provide you with a replacement at a cost of £5.00.



CAREERS AND EMPLOYABILITY

Your time at college is designed to prepare you for your future career, and that includes information, advice and guidance on courses, work experience opportunities and extra-curricular activities to ensure you're well qualified and stand out to future employers.

Our team of impartial Careers Advisers and Progress Coaches will be on-hand throughout your time with us to provide 1-1 guidance, information and workshops on everything career and next-steps related, including UCAS Applications, CV Workshops and work placement opportunities. STUDENT FINANCIAL SUPPORT AND BURSARIES
